WHAT WE MUST DO

We are to love God and our neighbor with all the strength of our being, as the scholar of the Law answers Jesus in this week's Gospel.

This command is nothing remote or mysterious—it's already written in our hearts, in the book of sacred Scripture. "You have only to carry it out," Moses says in this week's First Reading.

Jesus tells His interrogator the same thing: "Do this and you will live."

The scholar, however, wants to know where he can draw the line. That's the motive behind his question: "Who is my neighbor?"

In his compassion, the Samaritan in Jesus' parable reveals the boundless mercy of God - who came down to us when we were fallen in sin, close to dead, unable to pick ourselves up.

Jesus is "the image of the invisible God," this week's Epistle tells us. In Him, the love of God has come very near to us. By the "blood of His Cross" - by bearing His neighbors' sufferings in His own body, being himself stripped and beaten and left for dead—He saved us from bonds of sin, reconciled us to God and to one another.

Like the Samaritan, He pays the price for us, heals the wounds of sin, pours out on us the oil and wine of the sacraments, entrusts us to the care of His Church, until He comes back for us.

Because His love has known no limits, ours cannot either. We are to love as we have been loved, to do for others what He has done for us - joining all things together in His Body, the Church.

We are to love like the singer of this week's Psalm—like those whose prayers have been answered, like those whose lives has been saved, who have known the time of His favor, have seen God in His great mercy turn toward us.

This is the love that leads to eternal life, the love Jesus commands today of the scholar, and of each of us—"Go and do likewise."

**BLESSED KATERI
TEKAKWITHA**

Born: 1656

Died: April 17, 1680

Venerable by the Catholic Church: 1943
Beatified by Pope John Paul II: June 22, 1980

Feast Day: July 14

Kateri Tekakwitha was the daughter of a Mohawk chief and a Catholic Algonquin woman, Kahenta. She was born in 1656 in the Mohawk fortress of Ossernenon near present day Auriesville, New York. When Tekakwitha was four years old, a smallpox epidemic swept through Ossernenon leaving her face badly scarred, and her eye-sight compromised. The outbreak took the lives of her baby brother and both her parents. Her uncle, a chief of the Turtle Clan, adopted her.

Although Tekakwitha was not baptized as an infant, she had fond memories of her mother and the stories of the Catholic faith. When she was eighteen a Jesuit missionary came to her village to establish a chapel. Her uncle disliked the "Blackrobes" and their new religion, but tolerated the missionary presence. At twenty years old Tekakwitha was baptized on Easter Sunday and given the name Kateri which means Catherine in Mohawk.

When increasing hostility from her people was too much to live with, Kateri fled through woods, rivers and swamps to the Catholic mission of St. Francis Xavier in Sault Saint-Louis, near Montreal, Canada over 200 miles away.

Out of complete devotion to Jesus, Kateri spent her life unmarried. She prayed the rosary always and loved wearing the beads around her neck. On April 17, 1680 at age 23, Kateri died. Upon her death, her scarred face miraculously cleared. This miracle was witness by two Jesuit priest and others that were in the room when she died. She was declared venerable by the Catholic Church in 1943 and beatified on June 22, 1980 by Pope John Paul II.

**OUR LADY OF CARMEL
FEAST DAY JULY 16TH**



Our Lady of Mount Carmel Is the title given to the Blessed Virgin Mary in her role as patroness of the Carmelite Order. The first Carmelites were Christian hermits living on Mount Carmel in the Holy Land during the late 12th and early 13 centuries. They built a chapel and dedicated it to the Blessed Virgin.
